Who we are

The Scottish Environment Protection Agency ("SEPA", "we", "us" or "our") was established by the Environment Act 1995 and has its principal place of business at Strathallan House, Castle Business Park, Stirling, FK9 4TZ.

This privacy notice explains how we collect and use personal information to fulfil our regulatory obligations under the <u>Public Finance and Accountability (Scotland) Act 2000</u>, National Fraud Initiative (NFI).

The legal basis for processing this information is that it is necessary to perform our statutory duties (**public** task).

Background

The National Fraud Initiative (NFI) is the bi-annual data matching exercise carried out by the Auditor General and Audit Scotland. Public sector organisations, including over 100 in Scotland, and some private sector companies provide data sets which are matched based on risk. The objective of the exercise is the prevention and identification of fraud and/or error.

The latest NFI <u>report</u>, published in July 2020, describes how the 2018/19 NFI exercise helped to identify £15.3 million of fraud, overpayment and error in Scotland, with the cumulative outcomes from the NFI in Scotland now totalling £143.6m.

Detail

The 2020/21 NFI exercise is about to begin and under the provisions of Part 2A of the Public Finance and Accountability (Scotland) Act 2000, SEPA must submit our data as set out in the NFI in Scotland <u>instructions</u> for participants.

All participants are encouraged to use a pre-set checklist to self-appraise their involvement prior to and during the exercise. It includes assessing our awareness of fraud and risk and the activities we have put in place to mitigate these. It also assesses our level of engagement with the NFI and our use of the tools the initiative can provide us with.

All data must be submitted in October with the matching exercise taking place in January 2021. The data sets we will provide to Audit Scotland include:

- Payroll data
- Pension data
- Trade creditors payment history
- Trade creditors standing data

How we share personal information
